Advent Worship Series: How does a weary world rejoice?

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Christ was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruthlessness. The Romans treated the people of Israel with contempt, imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into subsistence farming. Poverty and destitution were pervasive. And yet, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people.

As Advent comes again to a weary world, we ask, "How does a weary world rejoice?" From the opening chapters of Luke's Gospel, we have found a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness. In the parallel birth stories of Jesus and John, joy arrives— despite trepidation, fear, or grief. In these stories, we find rhythms for rejoicing. As we move through our series, we hope to create space for acknowledging the weariness of our world while celebrating God's closeness with great joy.

And so, this Advent, we will hold space for our weariness and our joy. We will seek a "thrill of hope" in our hurting world. We will welcome joy— even if, like the prophet Isaiah, we cry out for comfort (Isaiah 40:1). In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice. *From: A Sanctified Art LLC* | *sanctifiedart.org*

The incarnation is a story about God taking on flesh to show us another way to live.

Resurrection reminds us that God's hope and love is the most powerful force on this earth.

Pentecost reminds us that God's power is born in us, too.



"How does a weary world rejoice? This is a difficult question to image, much less to answer. The world was the first tangible image that emerged from our brainstorming. This theme feels all-encompassing; it feels important to highlight its expansiveness with a visual reference to the globe. The other design problem to solve was how to reference both weariness and joy. How do you visually hold these contrasting emotions together? What feels connective about these emotions is that they are very human. We decided on the image of a comforting embrace, and perhaps in the space between the people, continents and bodies of water come into view. These two people could represent characters we follow this Advent season: Elizabeth & Zechariah, Mary & Elizabeth, Mary & Joseph. Or maybe the figures are more broadly representative of God & humanity or of the personification of joy & weariness. Two peopleone radiating joy and the other wading into weariness— hold the world together."

Food Security Ministries First Fruits

As we head into the upcoming holiday season, we are grateful for God's many blessings in our lives. While food is often a large part of our holiday celebrations, for those experiencing food insecurity, this isn't always the case.

At Fairmount Avenue United Methodist Church, we have the opportunity to share what we have been given with our neighbors. At the beginning of each month, usually the first Sunday, we can make a difference by participating the First Fruits Collection. Nonperishable food, non-food items (diapers, toiletries, cleaning supplies, paper goods, etc.) as well as checks made out to Keystone Community Services are collected by our children during worship. All donations are then delivered by Fairmount volunteers during the following week to Keystone (1916 University Avenue, St. Paul.) We hope that you will consider being a Keystone volunteer. Presently, we have slots open for December through June of next year. There are also opportunities to volunteer directly at Keystone helping stock shelves or guiding guests as they choose needed items. 





Blood Pressure checks will be offered in the Susanna Room from 10–10:30am and following worship on **Sunday, December 3**.

We like to think of Christmas as a joyous time of celebrating Christ's birth. A time of gatherings, gifts, cards, food, etc. However, death does not limit itself to any certain time of the year, month or day. So anytime can be a time of grieving. Also, grief seems to return at special times. Knowing what to say to someone who is grieving is sometimes a concern.

An article in a recent NAMI newsletter talked about **Responding to Suicide Loss**. Actually, I think the information is useful in any time of loss. Suicide loss survivors often report feeling isolated, abandoned and lonely because others don't know what to say to comfort them. Taboos, fears and discomfort around the topic can lead otherwise kind and compassionate people to either avoid talking with loss survivors or to make well-meaning but insensitive comments.

Cara Fox from the Minnesota chapter of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention shares the following **ten tips to help us navigate conversations with loss survivors** in a kind, thoughtful and compassionate way:

- 1. Say "I don't know what to say, but I'm here for you." There are no easy answers, it is important to help them to know you are a safe place to voice their emotions. It is also important to just be there.
- 2. Avoid saying "I understand

what you are going through."

Suicide is not like other losses. Each loss a person experiences is unique. You can acknowledge this and show you understand the complexity of their grief.

- 3. Do not ask questions about how the person died. Let the survivor take the lead. Let them know you are there to listen if there is anything about the death that they would like to talk about
- 4. Avoid bad advice and hurtful cliches. Avoid saying "everything happens for a reason" or "they are in a better place." Avoid giving direct advice other than encouragement to take care of their basic health needs like eating, sleep, and exercise. Remember there is no right or wrong way to grieve.
- 5. Do not place value judgements on the suicide. Referring to it as sin, a selfish choice, or due to lack of love, faith, or strength can magnify the survivor's grief.
- Do not try to assign or imply blame. Avoid saying "did you miss the warning signs?" or "was there something that you did to upset them?" These statements may increase the survivor's sense of self blame, fear, and regret.
- Be proactive about offering help. People often find it hard to ask for help. Offer to do something concrete such as take the dog for a walk, run errands, grocery shop, pick the kids up from school. These can make a huge difference.
- 8. Don't be afraid to talk about the person who died. Say their name. Give the survivor a chance to share memories about the person they loved.

- 9. Be patient. Don't place a timeline on the survivor's grief. It is a lifelong journey of healing. Common phrases such as "you need to move on" or "this too shall pass" can put pressure on the survivor to just "get over it." Feelings of grief can come and go for quite some time.
- 10. **Don't disappear.** The weeks and months following the funeral can be hard as the full weight of the loss sinks in. Continue to check in and let them know you are thinking about them.
